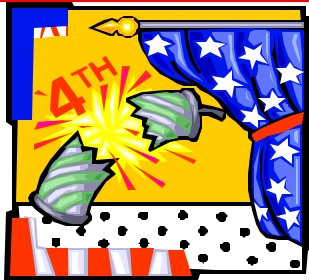

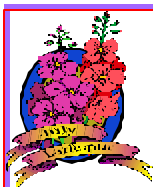

Council Chair Vincent C. Gray is probably one of Hillcrest's most famous residents and HCCA welcomes him as this month's speaker.

With his long-standing involvement and commitment to children, Chairman Gray has a solid reputation as a champion for young people and their families. His career in social services spans more than 30 years, beginning with his service as executive director of the D.C. Association for Retarded Citizens.

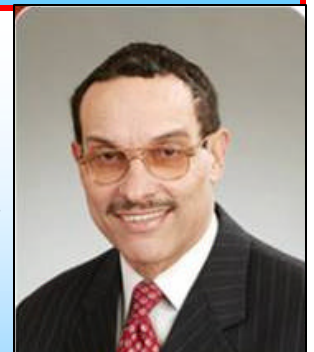
In 1991, Mayor Sharon Pratt Kelly appointed him as the director of the Department of Human Services, where he oversaw the functions of a 7,000-person department and directed activities related to public health, social services, mental health services and health care finance.

In December 1994, he was named the first executive director of Covenant House Washington, an organization that serves homeless and at-risk youth.

Chairman Gray assumed the role of chairperson of the Ward 7 Democrats in May 2003. In the September 2004 primaries, he defeated the incumbent Ward 7 Councilmember, and went on to win the November general election with 91 percent of the vote. He was sworn-in as a member of Council of the District of Columbia on Jan. 2, 2005. Since then, Chairman Gray has championed causes for District residents east of the river and has introduced or co-sponsored more than 70 pieces of legislation. He also serves as the chair of the Council's Special Committee to Prevent Youth Violence.

On Sept. 12, 2006, Chairman Gray won the Democratic Primary election for the office of Chairman of Council of the District of Columbia with 57 percent of the vote.

Gray, a native Washingtonian, is a proud product of the District of Columbia public school system. He attended undergraduate and graduate school at George Washington University. His wife, Loretta, died July 1998. They have two children, Jonice Gray Tucker and Vincent Carlos Gray. His first grandchild, Austin, was born January 2005.

Rules for Submission

- Recommendations will be accepted from any Washington, D.C., resident, but those from east of the Anacostia river are preferred because these businesses have already shown their willingness to work here.
- If you have a bad experience with a business, and want to share that information with your neighbors, consider posting it on the HillcrestDC list serve. If it is on the list of recommended businesses, the note "Neighbor reports bad experience with his business" will be added. If more than one bad experience is reported, the business will be removed from the list.

How to submit

Submit your recommendations by sending a message to Kathy Chamberlain at kathychamberlain@hillcrestdc.com. The subject of the message should be "Recommended Business." It will be a big help if you follow the format of the recommendations shown above. Be sure to include your name and neighborhood.

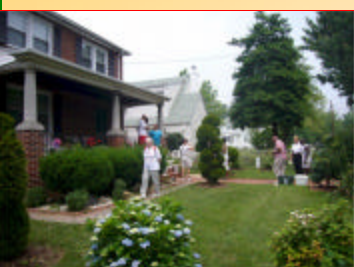
15th annual Hillcrest garden tour a success
