HILLCREST RESIDENT TRAPPED...UNABLE TO EXTRICATE HIMSELF

About the time of the turn of this century, a young woman residing in Hillcrest was sitting in the passenger side of the family vehicle as her mother pulled up to their home. She finished talking on her cell phone and rested it on the car seat. When she opened the car door, the phone slipped off the seat and with a "plop" landed in the yawning mouth of a catch basin (storm drain). It was night.

She let out a plaintive call for help to her neighbors. This was Hillcrest and neighbors help one another. Two adult men quickly responded. One man was wiry, the other was big. They quickly formulated an action plan. The big man fetched a pry bar and the wiry man laid down in the gutter. Somebody fetched a flashlight.

The cell phone could be seen, resting on a ledge. It was not an easy reach. The big man opened the manhole cover as the wiry man extended his long right arm into the dark void. Using the flashlight, the big man called out verbal instructions to guide the extended arm of the wiry man.

The strategy proved successful and the fingers of the wiry man wrapped around the cell phone. Then ever so gently, he bent his elbow and carefully transferred the phone to his left hand where the grateful young woman recovered it.

By then a crowd had gathered. Everyone celebrated! Everyone except the wiry man—he could not get his shoulder out of the catch basin. It was stuck!

As the wiry man lay there in the gutter he thought, "I may have to lie here all night. What if it rains? Suppose some car comes along and wants to park here." This could be a lonely night.

Then he remembered. This is Hillcrest. My neighbors are not going to leave me here!

The big man bent over and carefully manipulated the shoulder of the wiry man and helped him to escape. The people cheered!

Fast forward about a year later. The same young woman in the same car dropped her cell phone again. You know it went into the same catch basin and it was night!

Of course the lady asked for help. Of course the same two men responded. The same strategy was executed and the cell phone was retrieved and handed to the young woman. But there was one big difference—the wiry man did not get stuck!

It has now been over ten years since these two episodes occurred. In these ten plus years the young woman has never again dropped her phone into the catch basin.

CATCH BASINS ARE NOT "CATCH-ALLS"

Recently, a Hillcrest resident watched as an unusual looking truck with a DC Water logo pulled up to a street corner in our community. A motor powered shovel was mounted on the vehicle. Unlike most powered excavation shovels, this one was round in shape.

The crew opened the manhole cover on a storm drain (henceforth referred to as a "catch basin") and proceeded to excavate several loads of wet soggy leaves. The crew chief informed the Hillcrest neighbor that this was something the DC Water service tried to do once a year for every catch basin in the city.

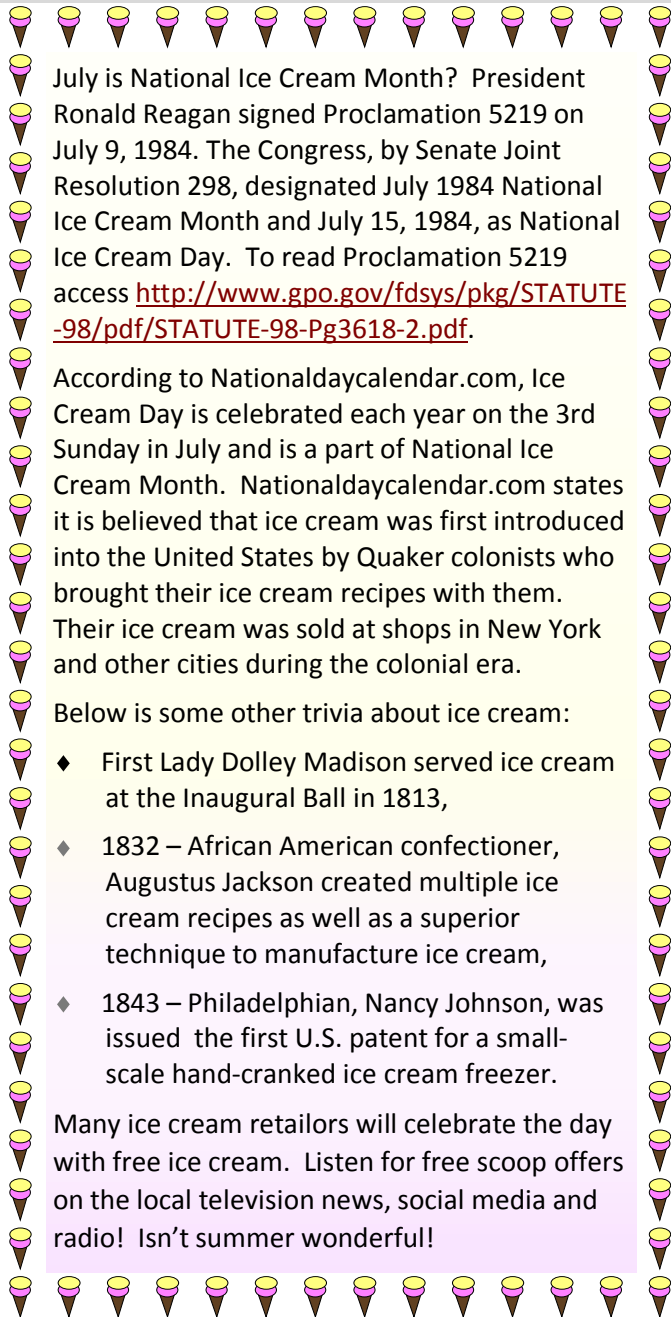
Ms. Pamela Mooring, of the Office of External Affairs at the District of Columbia Water and Sewer Authority (DC Water), helpfully shared additional information

about the catch basins in the city. About one-third of them feed into a combined sewer system, where sewage and storm water are carried in the same pipe. DC Water is in the midst of a massive public works project to build a large underground tunnel system that will hold the combined sewage and storm water in large storms so that it does not overflow into a waterway.

On the other hand, in about two-thirds of the city (the newer sections), the storm water and sewage pipes are separate. These storm drains are managed by the DC Department of Energy and Environment (DOEE), and feed directly into creeks or streams. A number of these may be found in our Hillcrest community.

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NATIONAL ICE CREAM MONTH

The Congress, by Senate Joint Resolution 298, designated July 1984 National Ice Cream Month and July 15, 1984, as National Ice Cream Day. Below is some other trivia about ice cream:

- ◆ First Lady Dolley Madison served ice cream at the Inaugural Ball in 1813,
- ◆ 1832 – African American confectioner, Augustus Jackson created multiple ice cream recipes as well as a superior technique to manufacture ice cream,
- ◆ 1843 – Philadelphian, Nancy Johnson, was issued the first U.S. patent for a small-scale hand-cranked ice cream freezer.

The spokesperson for DC Water stated that this does not mean that those bottles were thrown into the catch basin. They could have been carelessly tossed into the street or on sidewalks and the rainwater carried them into the drain.

By way of related news, the street renovation project

underway on Branch Ave, does include major reconstruction of some catch basins. The one at the southwest corner of Branch and Alabama Ave., has been flooding during heavy rainfalls.
